NOTICES OF MOTION

1. Mr D Joseph moved: That the House debates the increasing unrest, violence and destruction of property that are being instigated in the Western Cape.

2. Mr S G Tyatyam moved: That the House debates the continued failure by the provincial Department of Agriculture to be held accountable for its governance processes and its Annual Report for 2016/17, including the lack of transparency by the Minister, the Department and DA in general; and further asks what has become of clean governance.
3. Mr N E Hinana moved: That the House debates the shockingly high rates of femicide and sexual violence prevalent in our society; and proposes preventative, punitive and rehabilitatory solutions to these issues.
4. Mr S G Tyatyam moved: That the House debates the significance of the Philippi Horticultural Area (PHA) and the plans of the City of Cape Town and the provincial Department of Human Settlements to develop this area.
5. Mr B D Kivedo moved: That the House debates incidents of blatant racism and hate speech among all ethnic groups in South Africa.
6. Mr Q R Dyantyi moved: That the House institutes an urgent investigation into allegations of fraud and corruption in the procurement process at and awarding of tenders by the George Municipality.
7. Mr S G Tyatyam moved: That the House debates the ongoing, arbitrary and heartless farm evictions in the DA-led province.
8. Ms M N Gillion moved: That the House debates the failure of the DA-run Western Cape Government to address social challenges in the province.
9. Mr S G Tyatyam moved: That the House debates the impact of the skills shortage, the mismatch in the Western Cape economy and any plans that the government has to address this situation.
10. Ms S W Davids moved: That the House debates the increasing number of violent service delivery protests in the DA-run Western Cape.
11. Mr Q R Dyantyi moved: That the House debates the failure by municipalities in the DA-run province to spend their budgets optimally to improve the lives of the poor.
12. Ms T M Dijana moved: That the House notes with concern and condemns the killing of 4-year-old Thea Lewis, who was hit by a stray bullet in a gang-related fight in Uitsig while playing in front of her home; notes further that Thea is one of many children who have lost their lives in this fashion in the province during the past few weeks due to the provincial government's inaction in addressing gang violence; conveys condolences to her family and friends; and calls on the national government to intervene to make the streets of the Western Cape safe for our children.
13. Mr T A Simmers moved: That the House congratulates the Minister of Local Government, Anton Bredell, for his stern action and resolute courage in stamping out corruption in municipalities in the province; further notes that the decision to raid the George and Bitou municipalities by the Hawks is commendable and a step in the right direction.
14. Mr Q R Dyantyi moved: That the House notes that the councillors in the DA's embattled Cape Town caucus have been banned from speaking to the media or posting anything on social media without the express authority of DA censor Thomas Walters, who is also the Deputy Chairperson of the Federal Council; notes further that this move was forced by infighting in the DA council; and calls on the Federal Executive also to take action against honourable Premier Zille because she regularly posts tweets in praise of colonialism.

15. Mr Q R Dyantyi moved: That the House welcomes the raid by the Hawks on a number of municipal offices, business premises and private homes at George during a search-and-seizure sting operation; notes further that the operation was prompted by allegations made by individuals about irregular tender procurements and procedures; condemns the DA for not acting immediately when these allegations were initially brought to their attention; and commends the Hawks for the swift action they had taken.
16. Ms C F Beerwinkel moved: That the House notes and commends Cosatu's Western Cape Secretary, Tony Ehrenreich, for his enormous contribution to the struggle of workers in the province over so many years; notes further that Comrade Tony, who served as shop steward, official and provincial secretary of Cosatu since 1989, will not stand for his position at the provincial congress this year; and wishes him well in his future endeavours.
17. Ms T M Dijana moved: That the House notes and condemns the farmers who were caught stealing water from the Berg River that was meant to supply the drought-stricken West Coast municipalities for domestic, industrial and agricultural use; and calls on the national government's Department of Water and Sanitation to charge all these offenders as it seems as if the provincial department is not doing anything about this crime.
18. Mr K E Magaxa moved: That the House notes and welcomes the appointment of former Western Cape Premier Ebrahim Rasool as the head of the ANC's 2019 election campaign in the province; and wishes him well in discharging his responsibilities.
19. Mr K E Magaxa: That the House notes and condemns honourable Premier Helen Zille's latest outburst on Twitter about colonialism in which she claimed that it had helped to end slavery in Africa; and calls on the DA to be consistent in its implementation of its so-called De Lille Clause by recalling the Premier, who is constantly bringing the party into disrepute and involving it in controversy.
