SUBJECT FOR DISCUSSION

Ms B A Schäfer: The Provincial state of disaster as a result of the magnitude and severity of drought affecting the Western Cape.

FURTHER BUSINESS

NOTICE OF MOTIONS

1. Mr D Joseph moved: That the House debates the abuse, rape and killing of women and children in the Western Cape.
2. Mr T R Olivier moved: That the House debates the safety of learners and teachers at schools after another learner, Nadelin Lukas, was stabbed to death by a fellow learner after an argument at the Scottsdale High School.
3. Ms D Gopie moved: That the House debates the ever increasing youth unemployment in the province and the inefficiency of this provincial government's programmes to deal with it.
4. Mr F C Christians moved: That the House debates how this government is going to deal with the ongoing scourge of bullying at our schools in our province.
5. Mr T R Olivier moved: That the House debates the effects and factors contributing to teachers in the Western Cape experiencing the highest stress levels, as revealed by latest Health of Educators research report.

6. Mr Q R Dyantyi moved: That the House notes claims by Minister Bredell that unscrupulous people may have cashed in on the Knysna fires; and calls for an urgent investigation into the matter.
7. Mr M Mnqasela moved: That the House debates the successes of the municipalities in the Western Cape and lessons learnt for South Africans.
8. Mr T R Olivier moved: That the House debates that the learners at the Easter Peak Primary School in Manenberg were forced to write exams in the dark after their school was broken into for the eleventh time this year where copper wires were stolen; condemns the WCED for not acting timeously to prevent this; and calls for immediate renovations and security reinforcements at that school.
9. Mr M Mnqasela moved: That the House notes that the AG's report shows that the provinces with the highest proportion of municipalities with clean audit opinions in 2015/16 were the Western Cape (80%), KwaZulu-Natal (18%) and the Eastern Cape (16%); further moves to congratulate the DA-led Western Cape municipalities for their sterling work in achieving these great results and being no 1 in the country.
10. Ms P Makeleni moved: That the House lauds President Zuma's visit to the fire-ravaged towns of Knysna and Plettenberg Bay to engage with the affected communities, firefighters, as well as to witness the extent of the destruction; and notes the visit was not only welcomed by the public, but also by Premier Zille who got an opportunity to share her endless personal challenges and stresses.
11. Mr K E Magaxa moved: That the House notes that the ANC will have its fifth national policy conference from 30 June to 5 July 2017 at the Nasrec Expo Centre in Gauteng and wishes all comrades well as they plot the course for South Africa and pave the way for governance during the next five years.
12. Ms N D Nkondlo moved: That the House notes the international celebration of World Refugee Day that took place on Tuesday; further notes that the UN definition of a refugee is one who is forcibly displaced; also notes that this description does not fit those people who migrate within SA, people whom Premier Helen Zille labelled as refugees in a xenophobic moment; and calls on all South African to treat refugees with empathy and understanding.
13. Ms P Z Lekker moved: That the House commends Deputy Minister of Police Bongani Mkongi's efforts to fight crime in the province by distributing mobile satellite police stations in gang-ridden communities to eradicate crime and provide accessibility to service; and encourage people in communities to support such efforts.
14. Mr T R Olivier moved: That the House notes with concern that, while the battle for the Tafelberg school site is continuing, Cape Town wants to do the same thing to the land previously leased to the Sinenjongo High School in Milnerton; applauds the residents of Joe Slovo who are protesting against the building of new infrastructure on the land; and condemns the City for prioritising the interests of private property developers over the people.
15. Mr K E Magaxa moved: That the House notes Premier Zille's absence from the third consecutive sitting, ducking questions, and the fact that she is becoming a growing liability to this legislature and province; further notes that she is at present overseas and not visiting problem areas in the province, the government of which she heads.
16. Ms M N Gillion moved: That the House notes that the DA in the Western Cape Provincial Legislature is not serious in dealing with its own Petitions Committee and the law of this institution that guides it – something that causes a lot of division in the DA.

17. Mr T R Olivier moved: That the House asks for the appointment of an ad hoc committee to investigate the failures of the Minister of Education Debbie Schäfer; and that this committee will consist of 8 members (4 from the DA and ACDP, 3 from the ANC and 1 from the EFF).
18. Ms N D Nkondlo moved: That the House condemns the surge in farm evictions during the most cruel time, the coldest rain period of winter, when people are fenced in like animals, their water and electricity cut off, their roofs, and their doors and windows removed, leaving the most vulnerable open for suffering and disease.
19. Mr R T Olivier moved: That the House investigates the DA Minister of Human Settlements Bonginkosi Madikizela for using state-employed teachers from provincial government schools to mobilise learners to attend his party's 16 June rally held in Khayelitsha.
20. Ms P Makeleni moved: That the House notes that very little, if any, humanitarian assistance came to Cape Flats flood victims compared to the massive reaction in Knysna, as the whole DA-run Western Cape rushed just to be on TV in the Garden Route town and directed attention there.
21. Ms M N Gillion moved: That the House welcomes South African Public Protector Busisiwe Mkhwebane's latest report highlighting her visit to Cape Town's Masiphumelele and prioritising the plight of the community that lives in squalor on the banks of a stinking drainage canal that poses a health hazard to residents and a danger to children who play nearby (falling in and drowning); and she also noted that the community lives with the indignity of free-standing toilets on the one side of their settlement of which some do not work; and calls on Cape Town to fix the problems.
22. Ms P Makeleni moved: That the House notes reports that the callous DA has made petty party politics of the fire and wind disaster in the Southern Cape area around Knysna by distributing food parcels branded with DA stickers and with rank and file DA leaders participating in the handing out as can be seen in photographs and the question arises whether these parcels paid for by taxpayers' money.
